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A comprehensive “Talent Management” strategy does not isolate talent management to any particular area, they make it a part of everything they do and involve all leaders in the development of their employees.



If your talent management strategy feels somewhat isolated, perhaps it’s time to rethink your strategy.

Cannabis Update:

“We should have been doing a lot more research to find out just how useful it is, how it affects the brain, et cetera, et cetera,” Dr. Herbert Kleber, a Columbia University psychiatrist and drug abuse researcher commenting on Marijuana use.* Dr. Kleber’s comments are too typical in the world of addiction medicine research. The legalization of recreational marijuana is taking place without much information on the possible health effects.

Kleber hopes that the push to legalize the drug will stimulate long-delayed research. Meanwhile, he thinks recreational marijuana is “a bad idea. I don’t think we know what we’re getting into.” But he says its been hard to raise funding or enthusiasm to study the effects of marijuana.

What research exists indicates one powerful result of marijuana abuse relating to motivation and the internal sense of urgency. A study published online in *Molecular Psychiatry* ** notes that marijuana-dependent individuals had significantly lower dopamine release in a brain region related to working memory, impulsivity and attention – these areas experience a reduced level of urgency. Researchers reported, reduced dopamine activity translates to decreased motivation and is associated with greater emotional


withdrawal and inattention.

Current findings indicate about 11 percent of marijuana users fit the definition of dependence - the inability to cut back use. That's lower than the dependence number for heroin and other opioids (23 percent), cocaine (17 percent), alcohol (15 percent) or nicotine (32 percent). ***
